Transitioning While we are enjoying seasonably high temperatures in the 50s and 60s as we transition into the Spring season, it wasn't too long ago

when we experienced one of the most severe winters since the 1990's. During the eight week period between January 18 until February 25, we expe-



rienced ten cancelled school days and had only one full week during that time. In addition to the ten cancelled school days we also had five late starts and one early dismissal. The district made up student contact days on March 15th & 18th as well as extended three spring late start days to full days in an effort to regain some of the lost stu-

dent instruction time. The legislature approved the 'Snow Day Relief Act' and it was signed into law by the Governor on Monday, April 1. The Snow Day Relief Act allows us to reduce the make up days that were previously approved on April 19 and 22. Using those Relief days means that the School District will be recom-

mending implementation of E-Learning days next year. This winter will go down as an anomaly and will hopefully go back to a normal winter in future years.

Tip411 Newly installed this year is the School District
Tip411 app that is available for anyone to access which
allows individuals to submit an anonymous tip related to
safety, bullying or other concerns. School officials can
follow up with the individual while still
remaining anony-

mous. The Tip411 has been a useful tool that allows people to submit their concern and then allows the school staff to address the issue in a timely manner before a situation becomes worse. The link to access the Tip411 App can be found on the District website on the top bar. There are three options to submit a tip.

Option 1: Text 847411. Type in the word ISD2071 enter a space then type your tip and hit send. When the text message is sent to LCWM, the tipster's cell phone number is completed anonymous.

Option 2: Search the App store for Tip411 ISD2071.

Option 3: Send an online tip from the website anonymously.

With a positive attitude and a feeling of satisfaction, we will finish this year strong and look back upon the year with a sense of pride and accomplishment.



There is always so much going on around our school. As many of you know I sit at my desk often until later at night. I watch many of you dropping off and picking up from one event to the next. For those of you that do not have a child that is of school age yet you would be so amazed at how much goes on at our school! I am sure most peo-



ple think about the usual events such as sports practices and after school classes. I bet you didn't know that sometimes there are teachers setting up an ECFE classroom so a baby can practice grabbing for an object or setting up "toilet plunger painting" so children can enjoy a messy art night! A parent educator might be prepping for parents to come in and have a discussion about "What to do when my kids won't stop fighting!" or "I am so stressed out trying to have a job, raise a family, and

live a life that I don't know what to do!" It might be that 10 of our amazing Child Care Providers are coming in for a free training about "Positive Environments for Children" or we are prepping for our Story Teller to go out into those Child Care homes and pro-



vide a story time to that program. These are all things that happen in the Early Childhood Family Education programming world! Our "Knights" and Monday mornings are spent helping families through joys and struggles and setting up environments for children to explore and play in.

During the days we have our district's Little Knights Preschool program. Every year we see this program grow and grow! This year brought 119 3-5 year old students into our

building to attend preschool. We have 4 busy classrooms that have morning and after-

noon classrooms full of fun, joy, and sometimes a bit of frustration as our youngest Knights learn how to navigate following directions, sharing, being a friend, and just even being apart from a parent. We have just wrapped up our 12th annual Jungle Boogie fundraiser! A great time was had by all. This events revenue is used to cover scholarships for preschool tuition. We have many families that want their child to have the opportunity to attend preschool but the cost is difficult to cover due to



circumstances. Because this is such an amazing and caring community we have been able to make sure that no child goes without the opportunity to attend our program if they want to! This means that those 119 students will all walk confidently into this school as a kindergartner and feel like "I got this!"

I encourage you to do that so that I am aware before the start of school, especially if this is a new diagnosis for your child.

I encourage you to check out the LCWM website - under Programs and Services -Health Services Tab. This is updated with required forms for Medications/ Procedures, required immunizations needed, health plan forms, screenings offered at school, when to keep your child home and many other helpful links about asthma, concussions, head lice and so forth. I have tried to update it to fit the needs of our students and families in this school district. It takes a village to raise a child!!!! So let us help you with yours in any way we so they can be a healthy and productive learner.

- •HPV and Influenza are highly recommended but not required

A doctor will need to sign an exemption waiver form if your child has had the chickenpox or for medically exempt immunizations. If you are a conscientious exemptor from Immunizations you will need to have the form signed in front of a notary. ***New Exemption forms need to be done for Kindergarten and 7th grade***

- Signed orders by a health care provider showing the full prescription information/procedure directions with parent and Doctor signatures is called **CONSENT FORM FOR ADMIN-**ISTRATION OF MEDICATION/ PROCEDURE DURING THE SCHOOL

- *Not Student* Medications not picked up by the week after school is out will be disposed of by the Nurse
