walk-throughs in preparation for remodel. The board is also in the process of interviewing applicants for the Director position.

We received very generous donations of toys from Doug Nelson and Annie Legg and are currently accepting additional donations of toys. Little Lakers was also fortunate to be chosen as a recipient of a \$10,000 grant from Southern Minnesota Initiative Foundation. In addition to the grant, the center has been approved for a \$35,000 forgivable loan through Blue Earth County.

We are looking for donors to help us purchase some larger items such as playground equipment, curriculum, and remodel costs.

Minnesota AmeriCorps Grant

Lake Crystal Wellcome Memorial Elementary School has been awarded three full-time Minnesota Ameri-Corps Emergency Response members. These individuals will provide distance learning opportunities to high -risk elementary students showing signs of dyslexia or related reading challenges. This initiative will run from June 8th to August 15th, and provide support to our students that are most at risk of falling behind due to COVID-19 school closings and are most likely to benefit from continued reading instruction over the summer months. Students will work one-on-one with Emergency Response members over video-chat and engage in multi-sensory, explicit, and systematic reading instruction. This opportunity is made possible through ServeMinnesota, and does not require a site fee to be contributed from the district.


Teamwork As students and teachers are literally all over the country during the Stay at Home Distance Learning the school is using technology and communication to reach out to students and families. Teach-

5 doses DTaP (5th shot not needed if 3rd was after age 4)

Required Immunization for Incoming Seniors:

2nd Shot of Meningococcal

If you are entering one of those grades or new to our district and you are a conscientious objector to immunizations, you are required to fill out a CO form and have it signed by a notary and turned into the health office. This can be found on our health services webpage, under programs and services > health services >

If, due to COVID, you are unable to get your updated immunizations - please let me know and we can work through that. Many clinics will be willing to still set up these appointments as shots are required for school.
